softball committee in Ja-


They also took time to share skills for umpiring and some basic skill of fielding on Sunday 18th and Monday 19th.

31 countries for Asian Winter Games

SAPPORO, (INSIDE THE SAPPORO, (INSIDE THE GAMES) ---Thirty-one National Olympic Com-mittees (NOCs) will send teams to the eighth edi-tion of the Asian Winter Games in Japanese city Sapporo next year, it has been confirmed.

The Olympic Council of Asia (OCA) revealed the en-try list with action taking place between February 19

Eleven disciplines will be contested across five sports
- Alpine skiing, cross-country skiing, ski jumping,
freestyle skiing, snowboard,
blathlon, speed skating,
short track, figure skating,
ice hockey and curling.

The sliding sports of bob-sleigh, skeleton and luge are not on the schedule.

Hosts Japan will contest all 11 events, along with China, South Korea and Kazakhstan.

There will also be the added interest of athletes from Australia and New Zealand competing for the first time.

This follows an invita-tion to Oceania athletes by the OCA, after a request by Australian Olympic Com-mittee (AOC) President John Coates.

The idea is to give Australians and New Zealanders a further taste of high quality winter competition, but restrictions will be placed on them.

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Competitors from Oceania will not be awarded medals, even if they finish in the top three positions, and they have been prohibited from taking part in team competitions.

According to the OCA, they will be regarded as "guest athletes".

Australia will compete in

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Australia will compete in every individual sport except for ski jumping, with New Zealand competing in speed skating and short track.

Kuwait, which remains suspended by the International Olympic Committee (IOC) due to Government interference, are again poised to compete as Independent Olympic Athletes - just as they did at the Rio 2016 Games in August.

The country has entered a men's ice hockey team but no individual athletes

Cooks U18s satisfied despite losses

RAROTONGA, RAROTONGA, (COOK ISLANDS NEWS/RNZI) ---Despite coming away winless, the coach of the Cook Islands Under-18 team says the inaugural World Schools Sevens has helped them prepare for next year's Youth Com-monwealth Games.

Cam Kilgour's team lost comprehensively to the NZ Condors, NZ Fijians and NZ Maori teams in the tourna-ment held in Auckland last week.

Kilgour said they per-formed admirably given the lack of resources at their disposal.

He said players were able to see the level they needed to get to.

"We don't have a high-performance programme and that is something we are in the process of plan-ning with World Rugby and New Zealand Rugby, get-ting the Cook Islands level and the training that we need that other Pacific is-land nations have." Kilgour

"We did come into it as underdogs, but I think we

will go away with some really good ideas and the fact that we have to step up and we have to develop our pro-gramme."

The opportunity was also used to blood players with an eye to July's Games in Barbados.

"We will keep an eye on these guys, we've told them what to do over the summer and they all want to be a part of the programme." Kilgour said.
"They loved the tourna-

ment, even though the results didn't go our way, they had a fantastic time. They had a taste of international Sevens and they all want of be a part of it.
